DEFENDANT RICHARD DAVIS MALLERY'S COMMENTS ON THE PROPOSED "INTERIM PROCEDURAL ORDER FOR THE ADJUDICATION OF WATER RIGHTS CLAIMS IN THE ZUNI RIVER BASIN" PROVIDED BY THE SPECIAL MASTER AT THE JANUARY 16, 2003 SCHEDULING AND STATUS CONFERENCE

COMES NOW, Defendant Richard Davis Mallery, by and through his undersigned attorneys, and hereby provides the following comments on the proposed "Interim Procedural Order for the Adjudication of Water Rights Claims in the Zuni River Basin" ("Proposed Order") provided by the Special Master at the January 16, 2003, Scheduling and Status Conference.

1. The Proposed Order states "[f]or each of the subsections delineated by the United States of America . . . a hydrographic survey report shall be filed when the survey is completed. Once the hydrographic survey is completed, Defendants will have the burden of undoing any errors in the survey. "[C]laimants who disagree with any element of the proposed Consent Order may choose to file the Answer Form, describing the extent of the disagreement with the Consent Order, or alert the United States as to any errors." (Proposed

Order ¶II.B.).

2. In order to expedite the process, Defendants should, prior to the commencement of the hydrographic survey, have the opportunity to provide written comments on the initial criteria used in the hydrographic survey that will have the effect of determining priority dates, purposes and amounts of water used, periods and places of use, whether land has been irrigated and whether a use is beneficial.

3. Defendant Mallery proposes that the Court insert the following language at the end of paragraph II.B. <u>Disagreement</u>: "Prior to the commencement of the hydrographic survey, Claimants shall have the opportunity to provide written comments on the initial criteria used in the hydrographic survey that will have the effect of determining priority dates, purposes and amounts of water used, periods and places of use, whether land has been irrigated and whether a use is beneficial."

4. The stated purpose of the draft order is "to guide the course of the adjudication of the *non-federal* rights claims in the Zuni River Basin." (emphasis added). The Court will consider Federal, Tribal and State agency claims on a separate schedule. (*See*, Order, entered on July 15, 2002, by District Judge Bruce D. Black setting the schedule for and directing the Special Master and parties regarding the conduct of this case). There is no interim procedural order to guide the course of the adjudication of the Federal, Tribal and State agency claims.

5. During the January 16, 2003, Scheduling and Status Conference, various counsel indicated that Indian and non-Indian federal claims might not be filed for another two to three years. One of Defendant Mallery's affirmative defenses asserts that Zuni Pueblo and its water rights are constrained by the Pueblo Indian water rights doctrine and are measured by historical beneficial use and demand as well as the obligation to balance its uses against the needs of others within the Basin. Another asserts that the water rights of individual Navajo allottees are limited to actual beneficial use.

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6. In the interest of fairness, Defendant Mallery requests that the Proposed Order be revised to reflect that the same hydrographic survey criteria applied to the nonfederal, non-Indian rights claims will also be used during the hydrographic survey for the Indian rights claims.

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7. Defendant Mallery proposes that the Court insert the following language at the end of paragraph II.B. <u>Disagreement</u> and after the language inserted according to Comment 1 above relating to the opportunity to provide input on the hydrographic survey criteria: "The same hydrographic survey criteria applied to the non-federal, non-Indian rights claims will also be used during the hydrographic survey for the Indian rights claims."

8. The draft order states in paragraph I.F., that the United States shall publish and post notices of public meetings at least one week prior to the meetings. One week may not be sufficient to ensure all interested claimants receive notice prior to the meetings.

9. Defendant Mallery requests that the last sentence of paragraph I.F. of the draft order be revised to provide for a two-week notice period.

10. In July 2002, the Court ordered Plaintiffs to amend the Complaint to reflect the status of this case as a water adjudication once the Court has accepted the definition of the scope of the adjudication. An amended complaint has not yet been filed.

11. Depending on the nature and extent of the amendments, it may be premature at this time to enter a procedural order. Defendant Mallery requests an opportunity to submit additional comments regarding the Proposed Order after the amended Complaint has been filed.

For the foregoing reasons, Defendant Mallery respectfully requests the Special Master revise the Proposed Order as set forth above.
